Pawtucket, Rhode Island

Easy to Follow Directions from Normandy Farms:

Turn left out of park onto West Street and continue 1.3 miles to Route 1. Turn left, heading south and continue for approximately .4 mile. Use the right lane to merge onto I-495 South towards Cape Cod. Travel 2.8 miles. Take exit 13B to merge onto I-95 South towards Providence.

Pawtucket is a city of 71,148, persons founded in 1671, at the strategic falls of the Blackstone River and the upper tidewaters of Narragansett Bay. It is a city with a special place in the industrial history of the United States. For it was here at the Slater Mill Historic Site that Samuel Slater successfully constructed and operated machines for spinning cotton yarn in 1793. Besides textiles, a variety of machines and iron working shops grew up alongside the textile industry.

Slater Mill – 67 Roosevelt Ave, Pawtucket, RI 02860 401-725-8638

In 1793, the firm of Almy, Brown, and Slater hired local artisans and laborers to construct a wooden building suitable for manufacturing cotton thread by waterpower. Slater Mill became the first successful cotton-spinning factory in the United States. It was dedicated exclusively to the production of cotton thread until 1829, and then was continuously occupied until 1921 by various owners and renters. Through the years, Slater Mill supported many types of production and manufacture, including tools for the jewelry industry, coffin trimmings, cardboard manufacture, and bicycle sales.

In 1921, after the last private owner ceased operations, a group of local businessmen with ties to the textile industry organized the Old Slater Mill Association to purchase, restore and preserve the Slater Mill – recognized then, and now, as the “Birthplace of the American Industrial Revolution.” Restoration of the structure was completed in 1925. With the support of 62 founders – including industrial giants like Henry Ford, Walter Chrysler, and Harvey Firestone – Slater Mill became one of the first operating industrial museums in the United States. In 1966, Slater Mill was designated a National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service. Today, the Slater Mill campus includes three historic structures, gift shop, exhibition gallery space, the Jencks Education Conference Center and rental hall, and the Hodgson Rotary Park, open to the community for passive recreation and special events. McCoy Stadium - 1 Columbus Ave, Pawtucket, RI 02860 401-724-7300

Take in a AAA Baseball game at McCoy! You just may see the next Major League baseball star as it's the last stop before the majors. Oftentimes Red Sox players rehab at McCoy as well. The stadium was built in 1942. It's named in honor of Thomas P. McCoy, who was mayor of Pawtucket, RI from 1936-1945. The ballpark has been home for the Red Sox AAA affiliate since 1973. Before that it

hosted games for teams like the Maroons and the Slaters in the New England League to the Sox AA team. McCoy is the place where baseball's "Longest Game" was played. It began on April 18, 1981 between the Rochester Red Wings and Pawtucket Red Sox. It lasted 33 innings in 8 hours over two days. The game was suspended just after 4 A.M April 19th by order of the league president and wasn't picked up again until June 23RD. It ended with the Pawsox (Pawtucket Red Sox) winning 3-2. McCoy has undergone some renovations through the years, and in 1999, the "New" stadium opened.

Free parking is available at McCoy Stadium on a first come, first served basis. Free parking is also available on either side of Division Street, Ashton Street or Delta Drive and at the Jenks Junior High School on the corner of Division Street & Ashton Street. Once the free parking has been filled, parking at Quebecor World on Delta Drive for a small fee.

Turn left out of park onto West Street and continue 1.3 miles to Route 1. Turn left, heading south and continue for approximately .4 mile. Use the right lane to merge onto I-495 South towards Cape Cod. Travel 2.8 miles. Take exit 13B to merge onto I-95 South towards Providence. At this point, follow directions related to your desired destination.

Time to go home? Travel to I-95 North take exit 6B to merge onto I-495 North towards Worcester. Take exit 14A to merge onto US-1 N toward Wrentham. Follow US-1 N for 1 mile. Turn right onto Thurston St to West St.

ATWELLS AVE / FEDERAL HILL PROVIDENCE

Easy to Follow Directions from Normandy Farms:

Turn left out of park onto West Street and continue 1.3 miles to Route 1. Turn left, heading south and continue for approximately .4 mile. Use the right lane to merge onto I-495 South towards Cape Cod. Travel 2.8 miles. Take exit 13B to merge onto I-95 South towards Providence. Travel South for approximately 17 miles. Take Atwells Ave Exit 21. Turn right off exit onto Atwells Ave.

Parking tip: After turning right onto Atwells Ave you will drive under a Huge Pine cone hanging over the middle of the street. Proceed to the stop light and turn right onto Dean Street. Take an immediate left onto Spruce Street. On the right side of the street there is a bank of metered parking spaces that run along Spruce Street. You can park there, cross the street and walk a few steps through DePasquale Square to Atwells Ave.

Time to go home? Travel on Atwells Ave for .5 mile to I-95 North. Take exit 6B to merge onto I-495 North towards Worcester. Take exit 14A to merge onto US-1 N toward Wrentham. Follow US-1 N for 1 mile. Turn right onto Thurston St to West St.

The gateway arch over Atwells Avenue anchors the La Pigna (“Pine Cone”) sculpture hanging from its center. Often mistakenly referred to as “The Pineapple,” La Pigna is a traditional Italian symbol of abundance and quality and has become the symbol of Federal Hill. Providence’s historic Federal Hill has been called the “Heartbeat of Providence” and begins at Atwells Avenue. There, you can listen to church bells while walking on cobblestone paths, shop at food markets and boutiques, or dine in some of the finest restaurants in the country.

You’ll also find bakeries and coffee shops, professional services, and live music outdoors in the square. A place dedicated to the Italian immigrants who gathered here as a community, Federal Hill remains a place of charm, warmth and hospitality to all who visit.

The Museum’s collection is composed of seven departments and includes about 100,000 objects of art and design. Distinguished by its relationship to the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD), the Museum educates and inspires artists, designers, students, scholars, and the general public through exhibitions, programs, and publications.

The development of the Rhode Island School of Design and the RISD Museum is tied to Rhode Island’s emergence after the Civil War as the most heavily industrialized state in the Union, and to the growing desire for better design in manufacturing. With the region’s prosperity based on the production of silverware, jewelry, machine tools, steam engines, files, screws, and textiles, leading manufacturers and civic leaders felt the need for industrial-arts education and exposure to examples of fine art.

Even before the war, the Rhode Island Art Association, chartered in 1854, determined “to establish in Providence a permanent Art Museum and Gallery of the Arts and Design.” In the absence of either state funding or private donations, however, the creation of a design school and art museum in Rhode Island did not occur until 1877. Faced with a choice between erecting a drinking fountain in Roger Williams Park or founding a school of design—the latter proposed by Helen Adelia Rowe Metcalf (1830–1895)—the Rhode Island Women’s Centennial Commission in that year voted to establish the Rhode Island

School of Design by allocating to it the modest \$1,675 remaining from its fund-raising for the Women's Pavilion at the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia.

Ancient Art - The Ancient Art collection includes bronze figural sculpture and vessels, an exceptional collection of Greek coins, stone sculpture, Greek vases, paintings, and mosaics, as well as Roman jewelry and glass.

Asian Art - The Asian Art collection spans a period of almost 5,000 years and covering the geographic areas of East Asia, South and Southeast Asia, and the Islamic world.

Contemporary Art - Created in 2000, the Contemporary Art collection includes painting, sculpture, video, mixed media, and interdisciplinary work, dating from 1960 to the present.

Costume and Textiles - The RISD Museum has one of the finest collections of historical textiles and items of dress in this country, with a range that spans the centuries from at least 1500 BCE to the present and that includes representative cloth and clothing from as many geographic areas as possible.

Decorative Arts and Design - The Decorative Arts and Design department's collections encompass European and American furniture, silver, metalwork, wallpaper, ceramics, glass, and plastics from the medieval period to the present.

Painting and Sculpture - The Painting and Sculpture collection includes works of European and American art from the 12th through the mid-20th century.

Prints, Drawings, and Photographs - The Prints, Drawings, & Photographs collection comprises more than 25,000 works including prints, drawings, and photographs, and dating from the 15th century to the present. <http://risdmuseum.org/>

POINT JUDITH GALILEE

Easy to Follow Directions from Normandy Farms: Turn left out of the park onto West Street and continue 1.3 miles to Route 1. Turn left, heading south and continue approximately .4 mile. Use the right lane to merge onto I-495 South towards Cape Cod. Travel 2.8 miles. Take exit 13B to merge onto I-95 South towards Providence. Travel approximately 17 miles. Keep left at the split to continue on I-95 South. Travel approximately 12 miles. Keep left at the fork to RI-4 S, follow signs for North Kingstown. Drive approximately 8 miles. Continue straight onto US-1 South. Take exit toward Point Judith Scarborough/RI-108. Turn right onto Woodruff Ave (signs for RI-108/Narragansett/Point Judith). Turn right onto RI-108 S/Old Point Judith Rd/Point Judith Rd. Turn right onto Galilee Escape Rd. Turn left onto Great Rd. Continue straight to stay on Great Island Rd to the Block Island Ferry, Salty Brine Beach, or restaurants noted below. Total driving distance from Normandy Farms: 59 miles. Approximately 1hr 10 min drive time.

Ready to return home? Head east on Sand Hill Cove Rd for 1.4 miles. Turn left onto RI-108 N / Pt Judith Road and travel approximately 4 miles. Use the right lane to merge onto US-1 N via the ramp to Providence. Travel for 8 miles. Use 2 left lanes to turn slightly left onto RI-4 N. Travel for 10 miles. Merge onto 95 N. After traveling approximately 2.8 miles keep right at the fork to stay on 95N. Keep left to stay on I-95 N for 19 miles. Take exit 6B to merge onto I-495 N toward Worcester. Take exit 14A to merge onto US-1 N toward Wrentham. Merge onto US-1 N. Turn right onto Thurston St. Continue onto West St.

- As you turn onto the short strip that is Galilee Escape Road, look to your right. If it is low tide you will see a row of vehicles parked alongside the road. Look past the cars to the water beyond. The occupants of these vehicles are nearby, wading in the water, engaged in "quahogging" or "clamming". They are harvesting their dinners! A soft shell clam, also known as a steamer, breathes and feeds through its neck, which is between 6 and 8 inches long. A quahog has a small neck. The smallest, youngest quahogs are called little necks, medium sized are called cherry-stones and the biggest are called chowders. The neck size affects how the clams live, and how we dig them. A quahog lives just beneath the surface while steamers live deep below the surface. You go "scratching" for quahogs and "digging" for steamers. A steamer must be at least two inches long to keep legally, a quahog needs to be at least one-inch thick.

Roger Wheeler State Beach 100 Sand Hill Cove Road, Narragansett, RI

Also known as Sand Hill Cove Beach. This popular beach has fine white sand, calm water and a very slight drop-off. There is a playground area, concession building, picnic tables, bathhouse with coin-operated hot showers, a life-guard tower, and an environmental educational area. Lots of parking.
