Slater Mill – 67 Roosevelt Ave, Pawtucket 401-725-8638 (exit 42)

In 1793, the firm of Almy, Brown, and Slater hired local artisans and laborers to construct a wooden building suitable for manufacturing cotton thread by waterpower. Slater Mill became the first successful cotton-spinning factory in the United States. It was dedicated exclusively to the production of cotton thread until 1829, and then was continuously occupied until 1921 by various owners and renters. Through the years, Slater Mill supported many types of production and manufacture, including tools for the jewelry industry, coffin trimmings, cardboard manufacture, and bicycle sales. In 1921, after the last private owner ceased operations, a group of local businessmen with ties to the textile industry organized the Old Slater Mill Association to purchase, restore and preserve the Slater Mill – recognized then, and now, as the “Birthplace of the American Industrial Revolution.” Restoration of the structure was completed in 1925. With the support of 62 founders – including industrial giants like Henry Ford, Walter Chrysler, and Harvey Firestone – Slater Mill became one of the first operating industrial museums in the United States. In 1966, Slater Mill was designated a National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service. Today, the Slater Mill campus includes three historic structures, gift shop, exhibition gallery space, the Jencks Education Conference Center and rental hall, and the Hodgson Rotary Park, open to the community for passive recreation and special events. History

Providence was founded in 1636 by preacher Roger Williams, who was fleeing religious persecution from Massachusetts. Easily accessible by water, Providence became a major New World seaport. During the Revolutionary War, Providence's craftspeople and merchants supplied goods to the Continental and French armies. Ever the entrepreneurs, Providence businesses were financing expeditions to the Mediterranean, Middle East and Far East by 1781. With trade booming, the city grew and flourished. Traditional wooden homes began yielding to ornate brick mansions, and citizens constructed elaborate testaments to business, government and learning. One of the best examples would be the Rhode Island State House which was built with Georgian Marble between 1895-1904 and has one of the largest self-

supporting domes in world. Groups of 10 or less are welcome on tours Monday-Friday at 10am or 1pm and groups larger than 10 can contact the tour operator to request other tours (401) 222-3983.

ATWELLS AVE / FEDERAL HILL PROVIDENCE

The gateway arch over Atwells Avenue anchors the La Pigna ("Pine Cone") sculpture hanging from its center. Often mistakenly referred to as "The Pineapple," La Pigna is a traditional Italian symbol of abundance and quality and has become the symbol of Federal Hill. Providence's historic Federal Hill has been called the "Heartbeat of Providence" and begins at Atwells Avenue. There, you can listen to church bells while walking on cobblestone paths, shop at food markets and boutiques, or dine in some of the finest restaurants in the country. You'll also find bakeries and coffee shops, professional services, and live music outdoors in the square. A place dedicated to the Italian immigrants who gathered here as a community, Federal Hill remains a place of charm, warmth and hospitality to all who visit.

RISD Art Museum – 20 N. Main St. , Providence 401-454 6500

The Museum's collection is composed of seven departments and includes about 100,000 objects of art and design. Distinguished by its relationship to the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD), the Museum educates and inspires artists, designers, students, scholars, and the general public through exhibitions, programs, and publications. The development of the Rhode Island School of Design and the RISD Museum is tied to Rhode Island's emergence after the Civil War as the most heavily industrialized state in the Union, and to the growing desire for better design in manufacturing. With the region's prosperity based on the production of silverware, jewelry, machine tools, steam engines, files, screws, and textiles, leading manufacturers and civic leaders felt the need for industrial-arts education and exposure to examples of fine art. Even before the war, the Rhode Island Art Association, chartered in 1854, determined "to establish in Providence a permanent Art Museum and Gallery of the Arts and Design." In the absence of either state funding or private donations, however, the creation of a design school and art museum in Rhode Island did not occur until 1877. Faced with a choice between erecting a drinking

fountain in Roger Williams Park or founding a school of design—the latter proposed by Helen Adelia Rowe Metcalf (1830–1895)—the Rhode Island Women’s Centennial Commission in that year voted to establish the Rhode Island School of Design by allocating to it the modest \$1,675 remaining from its fund-raising for the Women’s Pavilion at the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia.

POINT JUDITH / GALILEE

As you turn onto the short strip that is Galilee Escape Road, look to your right. If it is low tide you will see a row of vehicles parked alongside the road. Look past the cars to the water beyond. The occupants of these vehicles are nearby, wading in the water, engaged in "quahogging" or "clamming". They are harvesting their dinners! A soft-shell clam, also known as a steamer, breathes and feeds through its neck, which is between 6 and 8 inches long. A quahog has a small neck. The smallest, youngest quahogs are called little necks, medium sized are called cherry-stones and the biggest are called chowders. The neck size affects how the clams live, and how we dig them. A quahog lives just beneath the surface while steamers live deep below the surface. You go "scratching" for quahogs and "digging" for steamers. A steamer must be at least two inches long to keep legally, a quahog needs to be at least one-inch thick.
